10th ANNUAL WV AMERICAN CHESTNUT FESTIVAL by *Jim Hoadley*

A century ago the American Chestnut (*Castanea dentata*) was the dominant hardwood tree in Preston County forests, accounting for 1 out of 4 forest trees. They were a large tree, growing nearly 100-ft tall and up to 6-ft in diameter. The timber was highly valued because of its resistance to decay – if you know what to look for you can still find 100-year old chestnut fence posts. Its nuts were delicious and plentiful. Gathering chestnuts was a reliable source of income for many Preston County families. Baltimore/Washington area buyers would ship railroad cars full of chestnuts from Preston County to the cities.

At the beginning of the 20th century the chestnut blight reached the Appalachians, resulting in a rapid die-off of most of Preston County's chestnut trees. Since there was no known way to control the chestnut blight, the US Department of Forestry advised landowners to cut down all chestnut trees, diseased or not, while they still had timber value. Within a couple decades there were no more American Chestnuts remaining in the eastern US.

The chestnut blight is a fungus that infects the bark, eating away at the bark until the above ground part of the tree dies. The roots, however, may remain alive and send up new shoots that survive about 10 years until they too succumb to the bark fungus. American Chestnut saplings are still to be seen in the woods around Alpine Lake. I protect the ones I see sprouting in my yard in hopes that one might have enough resistance to the blight for it to grow big enough to produce a few chestnuts.

There are a number of strategies that forest scientists are working on to develop blight-resistant American Chestnuts. The approaches include: crossing American Chestnuts with other chestnut varieties, selective breeding of the few remaining blight-resistant American Chestnut trees, and genetic engineering to introduce unique resistance genes into the American Chestnut.

If you are curious about the American Chestnut, the **10th Annual West Virginia Chestnut Festival** will be held in Rowlesburg on Sunday, October 8, 2017. AN UPDATE FROM THE BOARD by Barb Conway, President

News for this issue includes updates in answer to property owner questions regarding draft policies that are currently under board consideration.

Changes have been made to the proposed Social Media Policy reflecting suggestions made by individual property owners: (#1) Any post, which includes vulgarity, profanity, or language which demeans an individual or group of individuals, will be immediately removed without the requirement of a review. (#6) Any property owner whose posts elicit a total of 5 removals will have social media privileges suspended for 6 months. At the end of the suspension period, the property owner must petition to be reinstated. Changes in language have been underlined, and the policy will be presented at the Open Meeting on August 26th.

The Board has also begun looking at a draft policy for Video Surveillance to make our own comments and suggestions. When the draft is in a more "final" version, it will be made available for property owner comment.


A reminder/clarification from the Board of Directors
